# AOTF Research Priorities: Building a Vibrant Science of Occupational Therapy

The American Occupational Therapy Foundation recently announced eight research priorities that will guide future initiatives of its Institute for the Study of Occupation and Health. Knowledge from occupational therapy science in these priority areas will help to identify the preventative and protective role of occupations in health and the mechanisms that support occupational performance and participation.

During the last year, AOTF Director of Research Dr. Julie Bass led a comprehensive process to identify the major health and societal issues that would benefit by an occupational therapy lens in both research and practice. Activities included a review of the strategic plans of federal agencies and major foundations, deliberations by the AOTF Scientific Advisory Council, and input from AOTF's key stakeholder groups. At the September 2015 AOTF Board meeting, trustees enthusiastically endorsed the AOTF research priorities:

- Health behaviors to prevent and manage chronic conditions
- Functional cognition
- Safety and injury prevention in home, clinical, and community settings
- Technology and environmental supports in home and community
- Development and transitions for individuals and families
- Emotional and physiological influences
- Family and caregiver needs
- Health care experience: access, care coordination, utilization

Advances in occupational therapy science will require strategic investments in building research capacity as well as these research priority areas. Examples include research training support, scientific networks, and strong mentoring programs. Thus, future initiatives of the Institute will address one or more of the research priorities and incorporate specific strategies to build research capacity as well. To build our scientific workforce and the evidence that supports occupational therapy practice in these priority areas, the American Occupational Therapy Foundation needs your support. In the coming months, watch for opportunities to contribute to programs that you believe will make a difference.

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

## Breakfast with a Scholar: Lisa Genova, PhD

This year's Breakfast with a Scholar is Lisa Genova, PhD, the neuroscientist and bestselling author of *Still Alice: Understanding Alzheimer*'s is known for her scholarship as well as her ability to tell compelling stories. In her own words:

The novels I write are about people living with neurological diseases and conditions that are feared, ignored, or misunderstood, portrayed within a story that is accessible to the general public....Novels reveal the humanity behind these numbers. Stories are a way into people's hearts, and when this happens, we have more than knowledge. We have real understanding, empathy, sensitivity, the ability to be better caregivers, and maybe the motivation to get involved.



This year's Breakfast will look at the personal impact of Alzheimer's disease (AD). Dr. Genova will speak about why she chose to write *Still Alice* and what she learned about AD -- that the language around Alzheimer's needs to focus on LIVING with AD rather than dying; that people with AD shouldn't have to cope with being lonely; how to BE WITH people with Alzheimer's, to set the ego and discomfort and fear of awkwardness and unknown aside and just be with; how to use the principle of improvisational acting -- saying YES, AND -- to connect to people with AD.

Lisa Genova graduated valedictorian, summa cum laude from Bates College with a degree in biopsychology and has a PhD in neuroscience from Harvard University. She is the author of the New York Times bestselling

novels Still Alice, Left Neglected, Love Anthony, and Inside the O'Briens.

# 25th Anniversary of Americans with Disabilities Act: State of the Science in Occupational Therapy

The AOTF State of the Science (SoS) Symposium is designed to summarize current knowledge and evidence on a selected topic. Its goal is to identify recommendations for best practice and future research based on recent advances in science.

In 2016, we will examine the Americans with Disabilities Act which celebrated its 25th anniversary in 2015. The White House issued a summary of progress made in employment, education, civic and community participation, healthcare and healthy living, fair housing, accessible transportation, and information and communications technology for people with disabilities. The science of occupational therapy has contributed to knowledge, measures, interventions, and programs in many of these areas but there are still gaps in the evidence related to participation of individuals with disabilities. Symposium presenters Joy Hammel, PhD, OTR/L FAOTA and Diane Smith, PhD, OTR/L, will address the following questions:

- What is our current knowledge on the factors that influence participation for individuals with disabilities?
- What are the recent advances in research and some of the burning issues for this topic?
- What are the areas of certainty and uncertainty in research? Where are the gaps in our knowledge?
- What are the take home messages for best practice in occupational therapy, educational curricula, and future research?

We'll see the University of Chicago campus originally designed by Henry Cobb Ives and includes buildings by such noted architects as Mies van der Rohe, Eero Saarinen, Raphael Viñoly, and Frank Lloyd Wright and discover the South Shore treasures: Rockefeller Chapel and the Museum of Science and Industry (the only building standing from the Columbian Exposition).

Important sites in the history of OT will include the site where Bowen Hall stood near Hull House, the home of Jane Addams, it became the Henry B. Favill School of Occupational Therapy and the former location of The Chicago School of Civics and Philanthropy where Eleanor Clarke Slagle studied in 1911. The school is the forbearer of the School of Social Service Administration at the University of Chicago.
