Warm Greetings to Research Resources colleagues!

As part of the preparations for our 50th anniversary in 2015, AOTF revitalized our mission (advance the science of occupational therapy to support people's full participation in meaningful life activities) and vision (a vibrant science that builds knowledge to support effective, evidence-based occupational therapy).

Team science has been noted as an important development that entails the formation of large, cross-disciplinary teams to achieve the aims of research. Team Science and Team Work

My relationship with AOTF began over twenty-five years ago. During that time, AOTF created programs to support occupational therapy practitioners earn doctorate degrees, learn how to do or use research, publish this research in non-occupational therapy periodicals, compete successfully in the grant funding world, find the language to communicate the profession's philosophy to members of other disciplines, and demonstrate the importance of the role of occupational therapy practitioners on interdisciplinary teams addressing society's health needs.
